About the workshop

In the morning students will visit Compton Verney's *Sculptures in the Park* with a member of the learning team, where they will explore a selection of sculptures from a variety of different visual perspectives. They will learn about how the sculptures were made, who made them and why. Students will have opportunities for creative thinking, discussion analysis and develop considered opinions.

Students will have the opportunity to acquire the skills to produce a variety of sculptural techniques, exploring and experimenting with different forms and structures. To create a sculptural response from what they have seen.

- 1. Have a guided tour of the *Sculptures in the Park* exhibits
- 2. Interactive activity exploring visual perspective
- 3. Introduce workshop and learn a range of skills in crafting sculptures
- 4. Students will take part in a practical workshop in response to the sculptures in the park

About Sculptures in the Park

Compton Verney sculptures explore the fascinating idea of an ideal community. The exhibition tells a story of fitting in, friendship and fairness through the works of internationally acclaimed artists. These creative minds showcase their skills in addressing these important ideas through the language of sculpture.

Works by internationally acclaimed artists such as Larry Achiampong, Louise Bourgeois, Helen Chadwick, Nicolas Deshayes, Permindar Kaur and Augustus Serapinas sit alongside a major new site specific work by Brazilian artist Erika Verzutti, commissioned by Compton Verney.

This new work launches the beginning of a biennial commission series, inviting artists to respond to the unique landscape and its history at Compton Verney.

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Learning Objectives

• To be introduced to sculpture through the works of the artists around the main building and participate in an interactive gallery experience

- To gain an understanding of sculptural processes and working three dimensionally to create artworks
- To gain an understanding of scale and composition and how these elements are affected by location
- To develop creative thinking and ability to analyse an artwork and form a considered opinion
- To create a sculpture in groups exploring scale and perspective

Learning Outcomes

• An understanding of sculptural processes and how to create three dimensional artworks including knowledge of materials

- An ability to recognise different forms of sculpture
- An understanding of scale, composition and their relationship to location
- Ability to use the work of other artists to inform creative choices

Itinerary

10am – 10.15am Welcome and introduction at the Learning Centre

10.15am - 11.30am

Students will tour the sculptures with the Learning Team and take part in various observational activities.

11:30am -12:00 pm

What have we learned about sculpture? Think about how we can construct our own sculpture, in response to what we've seen, using wire, clay and a variety of materials such as foil, fabric and newspaper.

12:00pm – 12.45pm Lunch – outside or learning studio depending on the weather.

12.45pm – 2.00pm Students will design and make their own new artwork.

2.00pm – 2.15pm

Plenary at the learning studio. Students and teachers review their day and reflect upon their time as sculptors of the future.



Top Tips

Planning your visit and making the most of the day

- Your group will need appropriate clothing that they don't mind getting messy
- Prior to your visit, please make us aware of any students with additional requirements or special needs so we can make all necessary arrangements to support your students
- We recommend staff bring a camera to record activities
- We're a cashless site, please contact us in advance if you would like the children to visit the shop
- Students will need to bring a packed lunch and be supervised during lunch break.
- We encourage all adults to lead by example, that includes getting stuck in and having a go at the activities too!
- Teacher ratio for Primary School 1:6 and Secondary School 1:15
- Children 12 years old and under must be accompanied by an adult at all times. The supervising adult must be over the age of 18
- We cannot lead workshops or tours without a teacher present
- On arrival, coaches can drop off in the carpark. Coaches cannot drop off at the gallery owing to weight restrictions on the Upper Bridge.
- When arriving, please enter through the gate to the left of the Welcome Centre. The walk from the car park will take approximately 5-7 minutes. A member of the Learning Team will meet you outside the gallery.
